There were tons of rocket replicas, and even an actual capsule that carried astronauts safely home from the moon. When Simon's parents told him they would spend their summer vacation visiting a museum, he didn't think it would be fun at all. His trip to the museum turned out to be more fun. The student answers may vary based on the passage.
3	A & E	The correct answer and sequence is E, A. Simon is disappointed that his summer vacation will be spent at a museum, but he is relieved to find out that it is a rocket museum.
4	С	C is the correct answer. D may seem correct, especially since one replica is described as being "exact to every detail." But this phrase only supports the fact that a replica is not authentic, but made to seem authentic.
5	С	The correct answer is C. The Saturn V was held with strong cables.
6	В	B is the correct answer. No other choices are directly supported by information in the story.
7	С	C is the correct answer. Simon tells the tour guide that his parents had not told him that the museum was a rocket museum. Thus the museum was a surprise to Simon.
8	D	D is the correct answer. It is the only inference supported by the information in the story.
9	Α	A is the correct answer. The tour guide guessed that Simon had not known that he would be visiting a rocket museum, presumably because he had not seen other kids who were surprised by the rocket museum.
10	D, C, A & B	The correct answer and sequence is D, C, A, B. This is the only combination of choices that expresses the accurate chronology of the story. The beginning of the story takes place outside the museum, before they go inside.


